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Salve's After-School

The Center for Community Engagement and Service is partnering with the national volunteer service program, AmeriCorps VISTA to create three part time AmeriCorp positions on Salve's campus. Salve alum and Coordinator for Service Leadership and Community Engagement, Kaitlyn Brilhante in addition to students from the class of 2023, Emily Gibson and Eric Peck are excited to be Salve's AmeriCorp members for the 2021-2022 academic year.

Nationally, AmeriCorp members work with nonprofit organizations and public agencies to create change within their local communities. Throughout this academic year, Salve's VISTA members will be partnering with the local Thompson Middle School to focus on sharing Salve's



resources and talents to provide a safe, engaging, and educational after school program for 5th grade students within the Newport Community School District.

"Sammy's Afterschool Program", formerly referred to as the Thompson After-School Program, provides local middle schoolers with the opportunity to visit the Salve Regina University campus and interact with college students while completing projects and engaging in a wide variety of activities. The program is designed to help encourage higher education learning and professional career success. In just three months, the program has welcomed <u>23 bright and talented</u> <u>middle school students</u> to the campus and it <u>maintains a 96% retention rate.</u>

Sammy's After-School Program runs weekly on Mondays and Wednesdays in the Center for Community Engagement and Service on Salve's campus. The program is following the Project Citizen model, under AmeriCorps which is a civic education program for students and young adults that encourages individuals to learn about how to monitor and influence public policy. The curriculum thus far is encouraging participants to work together to identify and study a public policy issue, the Environment and School Nutrition. Participants are actively learning many sustainable habits in the hopes of promoting better lifestyles regardless of living situations both at school and in at-home environments. Student participants are learning about the importance of maintaining a healthy and balanced diet using the MyPlate model, about the importance of plants, crops and taking care of the Earth. Thus far, the 5th grade participants have been able to grow their own gardens and are learning about the time and effort that goes into growing healthy crops, that feed individuals, clean the air, and help the environment, while closely aligning with the Critical Concern of Earth.

A goal for Sammy's After-School Enrichment Program is to help Thompson 5th graders build upon their leadership and team building skills. As aforementioned, the program includes fun weekly interactive activities, STEM activities, and group projects which altogether are providing insight to the

participants on what it means to be a leader. An array of activities conducted across campus are a unique opportunity for students to experience and explore all that Salve has to offer in hopes of instilling in them that sense of importance for continued higher education beyond Middle and



High School. Hence, this program is aiming to guide students on how to become positive leaders within their communities as they are gaining an understanding of how critically important each of their perspectives are in terms of cultivating positive change. Our AmeriCorps Vista Members help guide them along the way.

Kaitlyn, is a 5 year MBA grad student majoring in Business Administration with a Cybersecurity Issues & Intelligence Concentration. She is very active in the Center for Community Engagement and Service as she enjoys giving back to the community through an array of service projects. Kaitlyn particularly finds the program rewarding because it brings forth different children with different perspectives, ideas, and abilities into a space where they can all feel welcome to share their skills with each other and most importantly feel safe. Kaitlyn hopes that the program will allow her to encourage students to explore and take advantage of a plethora of opportunities available to them at Salve and in Newport. Kaitlyn finds that, "It is important for the children to realize that they can simultaneously seek personal growth and academic enjoyment through a fulfilling after school program like ours."

Emily, a member of the class of 2023 is a Special and Elementary Education major on Campus. She is excited to be a part of this program as it aligns perfectly with her major and allows her to work with students which she loves. Emily especially loves that Thompson students get to come to Salve's campus for the program and states "The special thing about this program is the location as participants get the opportunity to spend time on Salve Regina's beautiful campus. These students get to see a college campus and interact with college students at such a young age which are wonderful experiences. My hope is that our participants begin to envision themselves at a University in the future and that their experiences in this program stick with them so that they are more inspired to seek higher education in the future."

Eric is on the path to a five year masters in Homeland Security and his majors include Administration of Justice and Philosophy. He enjoys the program because he believes it fosters healthy relationships and provides a safe, fun, and meaningful use of children's time afterschool. He states "After school programs

significantly improve children's performance in school and their wellbeing at home and for that reason, I am thrilled to be a part of the Thompson Program." Eric is also excited that this year's Vistas are working to build up a program that can easily be expanded and carried out years after the current leadership has graduated.
